a research perspective that takes language use into account opens up new views of old issues and provides an understanding of issues that linguists have rarely addressed referencing new developments in cognitive and functional linguistics phonetics and connectionist modeling this book investigates various ways in which a speaker hearer's experience with language affects the representation of phonology rather than assuming phonological representations in terms of phonemes joan bybee adopts an exemplar model in which specific tokens of use are stored and categorized phonetically with reference to variables in the context this model allows an account of phonetically gradual sound change which produces lexical variation and provides an explanatory account of the fact that many reductive sound changes affect high frequency items first the well known effects of type and token frequency on morphologically conditioned phonological alterations are shown also to apply to larger sequences such as fixed phrases and constructions solving some of the problems formulated previously as dealing with the phonology syntax interface

the branch of linguistics which studies the production and reception of sounds by humans is termed as phonetics according to the method of research the discipline is further classified into articulatory phonetics acoustic phonetics and auditory phonetics the consonants are divided into labial dorsal pharyngeal and laryngeal consonants depending upon their place of articulation phonology is a sub discipline of linguistics which studies the systematic organization of sounds in various languages and dialects the basic unit of a phonological study is phoneme some of the key areas of focus in phonology are syllable structure feature geometry and intonation this book attempts to understand the multiple branches that fall under the discipline of phonetics and phonology and how such concepts have practical applications some of the diverse topics covered herein address the varied branches that fall under this category this book is meant for students who are looking for an elaborate reference text on phonetics and phonology

this book is a comprehensive description of the phonology and morphology of modern standard arabic msa the description is done within the framework of the lexical phonology lp theory and aims at accounting for in detail the nature of the relationship between the phonology and morphology of the msa with a view to determine the role morphological and phonological rules play in the word formation processes and organization of the msa lexicon arabic variously known as the language of the quran and the d ʿaad language has several dialects which are spoken as mother tongue in all the arabic speaking countries however msa is the standard variety understood and spoken by people who have studied it in formal settings and is therefore regarded as the lingua franca used by educated native and non native speakers of arabic throughout the world the book introduces aspects of the sound system of msa and goes on to discuss the level ordered morphological system of msa words in addition it provides a well researched account of the various consonantal and vowel phonological processes at both the lexical and post lexical levels putting them into the lexical phonology perspective

this book is the first comprehensive account of the phonology and morphology of arabic it is a pioneering work of scholarship based on the author s research in the region arabic is a semitic language spoken by some 250 million people in an area stretching from morocco in the west to parts of iran in the east apart from its great intrinsic interest the importance of the language for phonological and morphological theory lies as the author shows in its rich root and pattern morphology and its large set of guttural consonants dr watson focuses on two eastern dialects cairene and san ani cairene is typical of an advanced urban mediterranean dialect and has a cultural importance throughout the arab world it is also the variety learned by most foreign speakers of arabic san ani spoken in yemen is representative of a conservative peninsula dialect in addition the book makes extensive reference to other dialects as well as to classical and modern standard arabic the volume opens with an overview of the history and varieties of arabic and of the study of phonology within the arab linguistic tradition successive chapters then cover dialectal differences and similarities and the position of arabic within semitic the phoneme system and the representation of phonological features the syllable and syllabification word stress derivational morphology inflectional morphology lexical phonology and post lexical phonology the phonology and morphology of arabic will be of great interest to arabists and comparative semitists as well as to phonologists morphologists and linguists more generally
